2017 Pennsylvania Health Poll

The following report provides findings from the annual Muhlenberg College Public Health Program survey of Pennsylvanians on public health issues. This year's survey examined topics that included the Affordable Care Act, heroin addiction, mental health issues, immunizations, marijuana legalization and the performance of President Trump and Congress in their handling of health care matters. The survey marks the $5^{\rm th}$ year of this initiative that is a partnership between the Muhlenberg College Institute of Public Opinion and the Muhlenberg College Public Health Program

Key Findings

- 1. While Pennsylvanians remain fairly divided on the future of the Affordable Care Act (Obamacare) with 49% opposing a repeal of the law and 37% in favor of a repeal, more residents of the Commonwealth have a favorable view (50%) of the law than at any time since 2013.
- 2. A plurality of Keystone State residents have negative views of President Donald Trump's handling of health care with 47% disapproving of his performance in this area compared with 34% approving of his work on this issue.
- 3. Although only 20% of Pennsylvanians approve of the way Congress is handling health care, this mark is the highest approval level the national legislature has received on this issue since 2013.
- 4. By a 2-1 margin Pennsylvanians indicate that the federal government should continue to provide funds to Planned Parenthood.
- 5. Keystone State residents remain divided in terms of support for a tax on junk food such as soda, chips, and candy, with 51% supporting such a tax and 45% opposing this option.
- 6. Support for the legalization of recreational marijuana continues to grow among Pennsylvanians with 45% of state residents now supporting legalization compared to only 29% opposed to legalization.
- 7.An increasing number of Pennsylvanians report knowing someone with a heroin or other opioid addiction with 58% now reporting that they personally know someone with this type of addiction. This marks a 6% increase from 2016 when 52% of state residents reported knowing someone with and opioid addiction.

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Methodological Statement

The following report contains the results of a telephone survey of 417 adults in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania between February 19 and March 3, 2017. Respondents were interviewed in English on both land lines (137) and cell phones (280) by the staff of the Muhlenberg College Institute of Public Opinion (MCIPO) in Allentown, Pennsylvania on the Institute's Computer Aided Telephone Interviewing (CATI) system. With a randomly selected sample of 417 respondents the margin of error for the surveys is +/- 6% at a 95% level of confidence. Margins of error for questions with smaller sample size will be larger. In addition to sampling error, one should consider that question wording and other fielding issues could introduce error or bias into survey results. The sample data has been weighted by gender, race, age and educational attainment to reflect those Pennsylvania population characteristics as reported by the United States Census Bureau for 2015. The calculation of sampling error takes into account design effects due to the weighting identified above. In order to reach a representative sample of adult Pennsylvanians both land lines and cell phones are called up to 5 times. The response rate for this survey as calculated using the American Association of Public Opinion Research (AAPOR) RRII formula is 10%. Due to rounding the totals provided in the frequency report may not total 100%. The survey instrument (presented in its entirety below) was designed by Dr. Christopher P. Borick of the MCIPO is conjunction with students in the Public Health Program at Muhlenberg College. The survey was funded exclusively by the MCIPO.
